One Team, One Fight!

In August, 2005, I reported to Al Dhafra Air Base in the United Arab Emirates to begin a tour as Vice Commander of a combat flying wing. I was immediately impressed by the leadership of the wing's commander, **Colonel Darryl Burke**.



The colonel's philosophy became clear to me from day one: he expected hard work and excellence from everyone in the wing, regardless of rank or status as Active, Reserve, ANG, contractor, or civilian. This was critical as 90% of the wing's personnel changed out every 90 to 120 days.

It wasn't long before I had the opportunity to accompany the commander to the arrival ramp at 2:30 in the morning, where he and a host of current base members welcomed in the latest group of new arrivals. At the end of the short, but invigorating, welcome speech, Col Burke shouted four words that, even today, make my heart pound faster. Raising his clenched fist into the air, Col Burke shouted "One Team!", which was followed immediately with the remainder of the current base members yelling "One Fight!" Col Burke repeated the chant three times and, by the third repetition, all of the new arrivals joined in with the unanimous and thundering response of "One Fight!"

As I heard this chant repeated over the ensuing days, weeks and months, I came to understand that the One Team he was talking about was not just the active duty members...not even the combined base population. It became clear that the commander was looking beyond our U.S. Air Force to include all the service branches. To go beyond our military and include our hosts (the U.A.E. military). To go beyond that and include our allies who were also fighting the same fight. And finally, to include the Americans back home who were half way around the world.

My small, focused world grew during those months to the point where I saw, more clearly than ever before, that I was just a small part of a larger team that had limitless potential to accomplish any goal set in front of it. When I returned stateside to take on my final posting as the Commander of AFROTC Detachment 159 at the University of Central Florida, I instantly realized that there was no better place to begin instilling the mind set of "One Team, One Fight!" than with the detachment's cadets. Since that day, the "One Team, One Fight" motto has flourished throughout and beyond the detachment. We can only imagine how many members around our Air Force either continue to say or, at a minimum, continue to live according to this code.

Even now, as a semi-experienced retiree, it is evident that we are all still a part of the "One Team" and that, we too, can support the "One Fight"...whatever it may be. Our input to this team can be on many levels...as an AFA member, through support to our wounded veterans, or by mentoring the young Americans that surround us every day.

We can never be too old, too retired, or too far from the battlefield to stop making a difference by being a part of the same "One Team" that is fighting the same "One Fight!"

The Emerging Leaders Program is intended to accelerate the development of field leaders and to inspire them to serve at all levels of the Association. It is also designed to be an enjoyable and fulfilling experience for the participants and a program that

Emerging Leaders Program participants will serve for one year and will:

A. Attend the Region and State President's meeting in Arlington, VA, in October, where they will participate in field leadership orientation and training sessions.

B. Attend the **Board of Directors** Orientation in Arlington, VA, in December, providing exposure to the roles and functions of the Board, observing portions of the EXCOM and Finance Committee meetings, and orientation with the national staff.

C. Attend the September AFA **Board meeting** as observers and serve as delegates to the National Convention for their state organization. Participants will be encouraged to attend meetings (Region Caucus, field training sessions, etc.) during the convention weekend.

D. Be assigned to, and actively par- councils or committees.

E. Be **assigned a mentor** for the year by the Vice Chairman-Field Operations. Mentors may either be the chairman of the council/committee to which the participant is assigned, or a serving or former national officer or member of the board.

War on Terror...

The news release from U.S. Central Command below had me thinking about an article in the August 2014 issue of Air Force Magazine regarding the use of airpower in Vietnam.

Central Command

"TAMPA, Fla., Aug. 17, 2014 — U.S. military forces continued to attack ISIL terrorists in Iraq Sunday, using a mix of fighter, bomber, attack and remotely piloted aircraft to successfully conduct airstrikes near the Mosul Dam.

U.S. Central Command conducted these strikes under authority to support humanitarian efforts in Iraq, as well as to protect critical infrastructure, U.S. personnel and facilities, and support Iraqi security forces and Kurdish defense forces, who are working together to combat ISIL.

The 14 strikes conducted on Sunday in Iraq damaged or destroyed ten ISIL armed vehicles, seven ISIL Humvees, two ISIL armored personnel carriers, and one ISIL checkpoint. These strikes followed the nine U.S. airstrikes announced Aug. 16 by U.S. Central Command.

All strike aircraft exited the strike areas safely."

Vietnam Experiences

The August 2014 Air Force Magazine article entitled, "The Vietnam War that Wasn't" by Jack Broughton makes the point that had the political will been to use airpower in Vietnam, the war would have had a decidedly different outcome.

Here are the opening paragraphs. "As the US first became involved in direct combat with North Vietnam, America's airpower resources were used sparing spastically, and less than efficiently. Many observers pronounced the mere threat of US airpower might bring the North to its knees. That did not happen. America's formidable and available airpower arsenal was only tentatively committed and was shackled by gradualism and micromanagement from the highest levels of government.

Because of this, the scene was set for a string of reports on airpower's ineffectiveness, that it was failing to "win" the war. Many historians still cling to this view.

But a good number of those who fired shots, and got shot at, believe to this day that had US military capabilities been better utilized, the outcome of the war in Vietnam would have been dramatically altered."

Unleash Our Airpower!

The argument about the need for decisive and focused airpower during conflict has been around since the days of Billy Mitchell. One could argue that the current efforts to provide military assistance to Iraqi and Kurdish forces is not on the same level as the war in Vietnam. However, we intervened in the Middle East during the first Gulf War and saw fit to enter into the War on Terror in Iraq and Afghanistan; so now some inside and others outside our nation believe we must be involved in the effort to defeat ISIL and to provide aid to the people who are being slaughtered or fleeing from ISIL in the group's effort to create an Islamic state based on Sharia, or Islamic law.

We are currently only deploying limited air strikes, providing humanitarian aid, and providing advisors to the Iraqi military. Politically, our government also supported a change in the Iraqi leadership which just occurred.

The will of the American people is not to support "boots on the ground" in this most recent explosion of violence in the region. Our President is reluctant to back down from his campaign promise to bring our troops home and stay out of the region.

Learn from History

History has taught us much about the use of airpower in conflict; it has also taught us much about becoming involved in conflict where we must win the hearts and minds of the people of the nations in which we are engaged as well as having support from the people in our own nation.

But, I have to ask myself what about the US personnel killed and wounded in the War on Terror (close to 58,000 according to Wikipedia)? And, what about the threat from seemingly insane and rabid people who want to wipe the "infidels" from the face of this earth...who say their flag will fly over the White House?

Our military leaders will provide the input to the President and his national security apparatus. It is my hope and prayer that they will take history into account, give sound counsel, and that our nation's leadership will listen to them.


